CALL FOR NOMINEES Ronald T. and Gayla D. Farrar Award in Media & Civil Rights History

onoring University of South Carolina Professor Emeritus Ronald T. Farrar and his late wife, Gayla D. Farrar, this award recognizes the best journal article or chapter in an edited collection on the historical relationship between the media and civil rights.

Submitted articles or chapters should be works of historical scholarship and must have been published in 2013 or 2014. We encourage submissions that address the media and civil rights from a range of local/national/transnational contexts, periods, and perspectives.

Scholars may nominate and submit their own work or the work of others by sending four copies of the article/chapter and a cover letter describing the merits of the work. A national panel of experts will judge the contest.



The winner will receive a plaque and \$1,000.

To receive the award, the winner must agree to present his or her work in a featured address at the Media & Civil Rights History Symposium scheduled for April 2-4, 2015, in Columbia, S.C. The winner's symposium expenses will be covered.
